Spectacular GCSE Success for CSIA Students

Huge grins and cheers could be seen and heard around CSIA as students received their GCSE results in the summer holidays.

With a 99% overall pass rate and nearly 70% passing in the critical grade 4+ English and Maths criteria, there were smiles and jubilation around the school.

One student who was delighted with their results was Naomi J, who received 9 GCSEs at grades 8/9 or equivalent and has secured a place amongst other very able students at Cornwall School of Maths and Science (CSMS), part of CSIA's VI Form Academy, to study for A levels in Mathematics, Further Mathematics, Physics and Economics. She said, "I'm thrilled with my results and I am excited be to studying at CSMS".

Outstanding A-Level Results for the VI Form Academy

Years of hard work and study were rewarded today when students at The VI Form Academy at CSIA received their A level results.

The school is once again celebrating with a 100% pass rate across all courses, with 41% of grades being A*- A and 85% of grades being A*- C grades or equivalent. These results are likely to ensure the VI Form Academy remains in the top 25% of the country. Students studying mathematics achieved nearly 60% A*- A grades. Students studying A levels in Science subjects achieved 75% A*- B. In the vocational subjects, the average grade achieved was a Distinction*.




















More than 800 Students Get Involved in Sports Day



Ollie Awarded European Space Agency Internship

In a great display of ambition, Nexus 11 student Ollie T wrote to a number of International and private Space Agencies around the globe hoping for a week's placement for his Year 10 Work Experience. Ollie has had the chance to work alongside many of the most influential people in the industry, including a number of the European Astronaut Corp and the German Space Agency, including his host and British Astronaut Tim Peake. Keen to maximise this once in a lifetime opportunity, Ollie requested to extend his placement a further week



His endeavours were so well received that he was rewarded with the experience of a lifetime. Ollie wrote to NASA, ESA, ULA and SpaceX to name a few. He received an invitation from the European Space Agency (ESA), European Astronaut Centre (EAC) in Cologne, Germany asking him to join them and began his Internship in July.

The EAC trains and develops the skills required for European Astronauts to fly to the International Space Station (ISS), while preparing for an exciting future of space exploration beyond low Earth orbit as well as focusing on missions and space medicine. The facilities include a full scale mock up of some of the ISS Modules, a 20m deep Neutral Buoyancy Facility (diving pool) for Spacewalk or more correctly Extravehicular Activity (EVA) Training as well as a multitude of simulators and classrooms covering every training need possible.

to encompass the weekend of the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 Moon landings, this was agreed immediately.

The journey has taken him from working inside full scale mock-ups of the ISS, to sitting on Command Console with EUROCOM, listening and watching the crews on the ISS, as well as working on smaller projects and delivering lectures on them himself.

During his 2 weeks, Ollie was able to be meet and talk with the team preparing the launch of Italian Astronaut Luca Parmitano, who launched to the ISS on July 20th, coinciding with the 50th Anniversary of the Apollo 11 Moon Landings in 1969. Luca Parmitano launched from Baikonur Cosmodrome in Kazakhstan, beginning his six month mission named 'Beyond'. Ollie was then able to observe the Mission Control team supporting the Astronauts on the ISS.

Ollie, who is part of the Gifted STEM Programme at CSIA explained, "Being able to have this experience was amazing, to work alongside Astronauts, Medical Teams, as well as many of top people in Europe who train astronauts and make sure they are in peak health!"

At the time of this being written Ollie is still out in Germany, having had his internship extended by a third week to further witness the first joint NASA/SpaceX Commercial Astronauts, complete their week's training at the EAC, as well as NAS who will fly to the ISS in mid September. During his visit, he has made many vital connections, ensuring links for future employment and internships are within his grasp.

Ollie would like to thank his hosts in Germany: Tim Peake, Mareike Morawietz (Medical Education Coordinator EAC / Internship Coordinator), Ruediger Seine (Astronaut Training Manager) and Martyn Cockram (Astronaut Training Designer). Both Ruediger and Martyn generously hosted Ollie in their homes for the period. In addition, thanks are due to CSIA VI Form for their Mini Scholarship and Connor Downs Residents Association for their grant.

Year 7 engaged in a mock election, creating their own policies as well as looking at existing government policies. Many created policies based on personal safety as they received input on safety during the summer including safety on the roads and beaches. Their engagement with political issues

was fantastic and reflective of the passion our students have for making a difference. This was revisited the following day, when our Environment Committee presented to students who are passionate about climate change. It was great to see how much they have done and what their future plans are to make a positive sustainable difference to our community.

Year 8 focussed on their transition from Key Stage 3 to Key Stage 4, and the risks they may face along the way. Next Steps South West created Careerpilot profiles with our students so they could start to explore future careers and higher education. Careerpilot also has a parents and carers area that is worth using in supporting your children in planning their futures. We take your children's personal safety very seriously and want them to be

prepared for every eventuality. They all received CPR and AED training. Students also had the pleasure of being trained by Declan M, Year 11, who has recently been appointed High Sheriff of the Police Cadets for Cornwall. The Science team led brilliant workshops on the impacts of healthy eating on our brains and bodies, and the impacts of substance abuse. There are many children who would like to avoid certain crisps in the future for the amount of fat that came out of them!

Year 9 heard testimony from a Holocaust survivor. The testimony was followed by a question and answer session to enable students to better understand the nature of the Holocaust and to explore its lessons in more depth. Our students' questions were reflective of their compassion and interest in human rights and





were a real credit to the school.
The visit is part of the Holocaust
Educational Trust's extensive all year
round Outreach Programme, and is so
important, not only for GCSE History
and RPE students, but all students in
encouraging them to learn from the
lessons of the Holocaust and make
a positive difference in their own
lives. It was a privilege to hear Henri's
testimony and hear a first hand account
of what it was like for Jews, and many
others, before, during and after the
Holocaust.

YZUP shared information about drug and alcohol abuse and ways in which to deal with peer pressure and how to recognise risk. Students also met with Devon and Cornwall Police to focus on personal safety. Their final session focussed on equality, human rights and the law.

Year 10 also met Devon and Cornwall Police, prepared for their work

experience placements, received sex and relationships education from local advisory service, Brook, and had a fantastic introduction to life at VI Form. Our students were brilliant in engaging in Post 16 activities, facing challenges from the VI Form tutor teams with trophies awarded for their endeavours in the Year 10 celebration assembly.

Year 12 had an equally fulfilling day at the University of Exeter. They had a great taster of life at university and engaged with the many activities on offer – a great foundation to base their UCAS applications on in September.














Nexus' First Appearance at the Greenpower Heats

A team of ten Nexus students from Years 7 to 9 travelled to Predannack Airfield near Mullion to compete in the **Greenpower Regional** Heats.

Taking their electric car "Nexus One" out onto the track for the very first time against schools from all over the South West region, our team exceeded the high expectations we all had of them.

The Nexus team were taking part in the F24 Kit Car category for years 11-16, all driving cars made from a 'rolling chassis' kit. They would be driving at the same time as the F24 Scratch cars (built from scratch including the chassis), but not competing directly against them.

The day started early, leaving Nexus at 7am to arrive at Predannack in time to unload and prepare the car for a rigorous scrutineering which checked every aspect of the vehicle and drivers for safety.

A team briefing followed where the racing and track rules were laid out for everyone. At 10am the track opened for a 90 minute practice session, and we took full advantage of the time, completing practice laps to get used to the circuit.

George P was our first driver, and he made an amazing start getting off the line and through about half the pack before some had even managed a few car lengths. After half an hour, George came into the pits and Max B took over, followed by Will G.

Being our first race, and despite plenty of practising on the playground at Nexus, we weren't sure how long our pair of 12V batteries would last, and

sure enough toward the end of the race we could see other cars visibly slowing so we made the decision to have a swift third stop and to change drivers to our secret weapon - India F!

India drove through to the end of the race and our batteries lasted the distance.

Our Race 1 result was better than we could have hoped; we were thrilled to come third in our class, covering a distance of 27 miles at an average speed of 17.8 mph.



CSIA Attends the Korean Science Fair

Earlier this year, two students from CSMS were invited to take part in the **Korea Science Academy** Science Fair (KSASF) in Busan. South Korea.

The KSASF is hosted biannually by the Korea Science Academy of KAIST, Korea's first school for the education of students gifted in science. This year, it welcomed delegates from 37 different schools in 21 countries worldwide. The theme of the fair was "Dream! Design! Create!" and students were offered the opportunity to showcase their research as well as a chance to collaborate and innovate around a series of STEM challenges.

The two students selected to represent CSIA, Tom T and Dottie S presented

their work on weever fish on Cornish beaches, supported by the RNLI. The students had analysed the critical incident data recorded by the RNLI and correlated it to external factors, such as air and sea temperatures. The judges of the science fair were so impressed with their work that Dottie and Tom were awarded the prize for Best Poster in their category (Biosciences) as well as an award for Most Innovative Research.

"It's such a valuable experience for our students to travel to an event like the KSASF and experience, first-hand, the pressure and excitement of presenting work at an international meeting" said Dr Gower, who accompanied the students, along with Miss Perry. "They did an incredible job of engaging their audience and of selling their research. Many of the delegates from other schools have commented on how

confident and articulate our students have been."

Either side of the science fair, the team were able to explore the city of Busan, whose rich cultural heritage and rugged coastline are both distant and exotic while still being somehow reminiscent of Cornwall.






