## Camborne students dare to open Pandora's Box in creative learning activity

Thirty daring students from Camborne Science and International Academy's partner primary schools braved the unknown, opening Pandora's Box at a Super Saturday Creative Workshop held at the school.

The children initially discussed the dangers of curiosity and secrets. They learnt about historical stories of people being told not to open doors, caskets, cupboards, gates and, in so many cases, the people just did not listen and faced the consequences. One person who did not listen was Pandora; her story comes from Ancient Greece and her curiosity resulted in a release of evil.

In the safety of the drama studio, the pupils were introduced to the Greek Myth and were invited to open the box and explore what it could contain. With the use of costumes, props, their body language, facial expressions and their voices, the pupils transformed into Greek Gods and Goddesses, into ancient Greek mortals, into fire and into the wrath of the Gods with the buzzing moths of the terrible evils that lay within.

In small groups, they devised a piece to show the class as a final performance. They learnt Greek theatrical traditions, such as 'chorus work' and drama techniques like 'canon' in order to enhance their re-telling of this mythical tale.

Caroline Sousek, who led the workshop with Rebecca Jarvis, said:

"They were a fabulously creative group who worked very well as a whole-class and independently. We were blown away by the quality of their work and how well they integrated everything that they had learnt."

CSIA run a variety of Super Saturday workshops to challenge and inspire primary school students. They continue to prove successful.

Shortly she will be competing at the National championships, and fingers crossed that her pain levels allow her to do well.

Swimming is very important to Kerenza. Unfortunately, she has had to pull back from competitive swimming until she has undergone her surgery. As a result of this Kerenza is becoming more involved in other swimming roles. Earlier this year she qualified as an ASA Young Aquatic Helper. Each week she helps to teach members of our swimming club to swim, primarily under 8-year-olds.

After been recently appointed to the Cornwall County Amateur Swimming Association officials team, Kerenza is currently training as a timekeeper but also has trained and appointed as the County Swim Meet Announcer, one



of the youngest in the country. She has become very confident using a variety of microphones and has already received many compliments on her diction, style, confidence and communication skills. #### A foundation for my future By Yasmin R

In 2016 I successfully completed my A-level courses at CSIA VI Form and was delighted to get A grades in Biology and English, B grades in History and French, and an AS in Spanish.

I really enjoyed my time at the VI Form because of the academic support and the wider opportunities that I was able to take advantage of whilst a student. I visited Thailand, Singapore and China as part of the International Programme; and Peru after successfully applying for a VI Form Scholarship. In September 2017 I will be going to Warwick University to study Biology.

The VI Form gave me the confidence to seek out new

experiences and inspired me to take a planned gap year. I wanted to continue the process of developing myself in anticipation of the challenge of an independent university lifestyle. I started in London by attending the New Scientist Live conference which celebrated pioneering research. I was so excited to hear astronaut Tim Peake speak and then to be fortunate enough to meet him. His exploration of new horizons really did inspire me to seek out a few of my own on Earth.

In the autumn I flew from London to the west coast of America. I travelled from Los Angeles to San Francisco and was fortunate enough to witness the geographical magnificence of the Grand Canyon - the natural formations and beauty of this National Park are quite frankly astounding. I took a detour



into the Yosemite National Park where we stood in the middle of one of the World's largest trees - the Giant Sequoia – and gained an insight into the passage of time. By now it was December so the obvious thing to do was find a market to do some shopping. Someone recommend Hungary so I hopped across the Atlantic to the Christmas Market in Budapest. My most memorable European festive tradition was eating Kürtőskalács which are the most delicious sweet pastry dish turned over an open fire. Back to Cornwall and the Lemon Quay farmers market for cheese and then home in time for Santa.

The New Year saw me travel over 8,000 miles to Thailand. I was delighted to be reunited with Fongfa my exchange student who I hosted 6 years ago. Without my participation in CSIA's International Program such a friendship would never have been established and I cannot emphasise enough my sincere gratitude to CSIA for providing me with this life-changing opportunity. Bangkok was great and made all the more enjoyable because of the company of a local





expert and friend. I then went south to Cambodia. I was witness to a spectacular sunrise over the ancient temple of Angkor Wat; explored Ta Prohm as featured in the Tomb Raider films; and Bayon Temple where monkeys seemed to grow on trees. My A-Level History was put to the test when I travelled to the Cambodian city of Phnom Penh where I visited the emotional Tuol Sleng Prison and Killing Fields. I passed the border into Vietnam and experienced at first hand the Cu Chi Tunnels in Ho Chi Minh, a key site during the 1955-1975 Vietnam War.

Asia was fantastic but I fancied something a little closer to home and some winter snow. Austria's capital beckoned as did a small town in Slovenia in Europe. The stunning architecture of Salzburg's 17th century baroques and cathedrals, and the natural beauty of the iced-over Lake Bled in Slovenia, left me dumbfounded. To give me the energy to enjoy the rapturous spectacle copious quantities of mozartkegels and

strudel were certainly in order in this beautiful region. I felt the need to touch base with the family so I flew across the Atlantic once more to visit a relative in Kansas. She was having a building named after her to celebrate her pioneering work in engineering and computing at Kansas State University. It was a fantastic reunion.

we took a short flight to Lukla. Lukla is the World's most dangerous airport because it has a tiny 460 metre runway and is sat 9,000 feet on the side of the Himalayas. We trekked to Phakding to acclimatise at nearly 3000 metres. The weather was changeable and could shift from 25 degrees to -3 degrees seemingly at the drop of a hat; the food consisted mainly of a soup starter with noodles or rice as a main and fruit for dessert: and the accommodation (known as tea houses) were run by local people with comfortable beds and friendly smiles. Next on the trail was Namche Bazar, a famous stop for all trekkers in the Himalaya region because we were able to purchase everything needed from socks to down sleeping bags, at a mere 3,440 metres. I had to cross many suspension bridges which

From March 18th-April 6th I embarked on a challenge that tested me physically and mentally. I trekking to Everest Base Camp at 5,545m, over halfway up Mount Everest – the highest mountain in the world standing at 8,848m. The expedition started in Kathmandu, Nepal, where I was acquainted with the other members of my team aged from 19-65 years and I discovered I was the youngest in the group. We familiarised

certainly tested my fear of heights! In Namche we were treated to astounding views of Nupste, Mount Everest, Lhotse and Amadablam at a memorial site for Tenzing Norgay. He was a Nepali Sherpa who accompanied Edmund Hillary on the ascent of Mount Everest in 1953. Onwards to Tengboche Monastery, a blessing from the local monks, acclimatization days in Dingboche and Lobuche - and on to Gorakshep at an altitude of over 3 miles! On Tuesday 28th March

I reached Everest Base Camp. Atmosphere - overwhelming. Views - breathtaking. Me - changed forever.

I am so grateful to CSIA for providing me with a scholarship that helped fund a trek to Machu Picchu in Peru in Year 13. It triggered in me a determination to take control of my future and to seek out challenge and new experience. It also made me understand that academic success is as much about persevering and





being focused as being clever. I would urge students to take hold of every opportunity they possibly can that CSIA offers, of which there are many, as these opportunities can be life-changing and will lay the foundation for every success in whichever future you chose to pursue.

#### A Canadian collaboration

Science teachers Mrs
Frost and Mr Egglestone
from the Camborne
Science and International
Academy took part in a
highly successful teacher
exchange at Fort
Richmond Collegiate,
Winnipeg in March.

Both teachers spent the week leading a collaborative research project based around soil health

and agriculture with grade 10 (age 15) Canadian students. This project was a continuation of a project that began at CSIA in November, in which our year 9 students were involved with investigating the effects of the mining industry on soil toxicity and the subsequent impact on aquatic environments.

Mr Egglestone said "The trip provided me with the chance to gain insight into how Science is delivered in an international setting and realise the potential for links between students from each of our schools. I am excited about the future potential of collaborative student research projects and am looking forward to implementing the new strategies I have learned in the classroom."

The Canadian project took place over 5 days and involved students analysing 10 soil samples from the surrounding province of Manitoba. Students conducted a variety of tests including microscopic analysis; CO2 respiration; aggregate stability; pH level and Nitrogen, Potassium and Phosphorus concentrations.



The results were used to test hypotheses based on the effect of agricultural practices on soil health. The students also received a guest lecture from Dr Christine Rawluk from the University of Manitoba who gave detailed explanations of mineral availability and its effects on soil health.

Mrs Frost and Mr Egglestone also had the opportunity to observe and take part in a variety of STEM based subjects offered at Fort Richmond College. They were impressed with the work ethic and scientific understanding exhibited by students, particularly the

approach to conducting scientific investigations.

Mrs Frost said "For me the opportunity to collaborate with another leading Science school on an international platform allows our students a fantastic opportunity to create successful research partnerships with peers from around the world".

The exchange also provided some time for the teachers to experience local Canadian culture, including trips to the Manitoba Museum of Human Rights; The Assiniboine Zoo and a day trip out of the

city to experience the Canadian wilderness.

Both Mrs Frost and Mr Egglestone agree that the visit to Canada was a fantastic opportunity for them as teachers and were glad to be involved with strengthening the link between the two schools. "Fort Richmond College and the surrounding area of Manitoba represent a contrasting way of life to that which we experience in Camborne and we are sure that CSIA students will benefit from and enjoy the experience as much as we did when they visit in October."

#### Dr Priyanka Joshi visits from Cambridge University

We were delighted to host Dr Priyanka Joshi, from the Department of Chemistry at the University of Cambridge, in the Old Grammar School building at Nexus today. Dr Joshi has visited us to give a lecture on her research into the causes of Alzheimer's disease.

She works in the Centre for Misfolding Diseases and is currently working on a promising new therapy which is about to begin the long, arduous journey of clinical testing. Her team have developed a new compound which appears to delay the onset of Alzheimer's disease by slowing the aggregation of misfolding proteins. You heard it here first!

Dr Joshi's talk was very well received by her captivated audience and she was kind enough



to stay to answer all of their questions.

After the Public Lecture, Betty, Meghan and Jodie from Nexus VI were in their element when they were lucky enough to have a tutorial with Dr Joshi, who is the Everett Butterfield Research Fellow at Downing College.

Her enthusiasm for her topic was infectious and their conversation quickly progressed from diseases such as Parkinson's and Alzheimer's to the very nature of consciousness. Her takeaway message was the importance of collaboration between disciplines in order to fully understand the system under study. In fact, in her research group in the Department of Chemistry, there are biologists, chemists, computer scientists and physicists all working on the same problem. Students considered the allegory of Plato's Cave, and mused on the nature of reality. As part of the session today, students designed and made hats, and then considered what had driven their designs. This led on to a consideration of Aristotle's 'Four Causes', and students discussed the prime cause behind human nature and the existence of the Universe at large. Sounds heavy going, but the use of props including play-doh and Jenga bricks to help to illustrate the ideas stimulated a lot of excellent thought and debate.

#### IRIS Amazing Atmospheres

In March three of our CSIA VI Formers attended the launch of the Amazing Atmospheres Launch at the Eden Project.

The Institute for Research in Schools, of which Nexus is very proud to be a Partner School, were launching their new research project. Cameron, Jenna and Martha will be using data from the Trace Gas Orbiter, currently orbiting Mars. They will also use a carbon monoxide detector to investigate the carbon monoxide levels in our local environment. The students will prepare a paper to present at the Singapore International Science Fair in June this year.





#### **Future Doctors at Nexus**

The VI Form Academy Medical Working Group sutured their way to success recently with the support of students from the Peninsula Medical School.

Our students learned to suture artificial skin with real curved needles of the type used in operating theatres. Another skill to add to their repertoire!

Betty from Nexus VI who will be applying to study Medicine at University next year also had the most incredible opportunity

this term. She had an individual academic mentoring session with Professor Philip Drew who is a Consultant Surgeon and an examiner for the Royal College of Surgeons of England, Imperial College and several other Universities worldwide.

Professor Drew sits on interview panels for Medical degree admissions, and during their 100 minute academic mentoring session Betty was able to pick up a hugely helpful array of information about the application and interview process. As well as tackling some tough interview questions, Betty was given the opportunity

to explore a number of ethical dilemmas of the type she might encounter in General Practice after she has qualified as a doctor. Betty was sent away with a wealth of reading material to help her to prepare for the gruelling Medical interview process she has coming up next year.



#### Rare Earth Elements and how to make millions



Professor Frances Wall, an applied mineralogist and geochemist from the University of Exeter came to Nexus recently to share her research about extracting Rare Earth Elements.


Her lecture was a fascinating insight into a little known area of Science – but one which we depend on fully in our day-to-day lives.

Did you know, for instance, that every single touch screen has a thin layer of a compound called indium tin oxide without which it couldn't function? Well it turns out that Indium is an incredibly rare and expensive metal and if you can find a rich indium ore to mine you will almost instantly become a multimillionaire. Don't get too excited though, Professor Wall explained that finding the right place to mine was incredibly expensive, based largely on trial-and-error and very likely to end in failure – according

to her you probably have more chance of success by buying a lottery ticket!

Professor Wall's talk included some audience participation as she highlighted some of the very strange properties of the rare earth elements and showed many photos of the exotic places she has carried out field work.

Professor Wall has agreed to work with our Year 5 Girls STEM Summer Camp over the Summer holidays.



#### Students experience Global Summit in Japan

Four of our year nine students travelled over 6,000 miles to Kyoto in Japan to experience a Global Summit, along with 11 other schools from across the world.

"It's difficult to put into words how incredible the trip was," said English teacher Melloney Matheson. "From the moment of landing, we were absorbed into the energy, kindness and commitment of the Japanese culture."

Molly C, Max H, Kerenza P and Lani A took part in the trip along with two teachers, travelling to hosts Ritsumeikan Junior High School - a school which CSIA has a strong relationship with having established a cultural exchange programme over many years. Molly particularly enjoyed staying with her Japanese family saying: "The Global Summit was a once in a lifetime experience. My host family were amazing and Natsumi and her family did everything they could for me. It was a true privilege to be invited to the school and meet all the wonderful people and learn about their cultures."

After his lecture, Professor Leader held an hour-long academic Mathematics tutorial with Mia and Conor, who are both hoping to study Mathematics at Cambridge University. The session was described by Mia as 'exhilarating'. Professor Leader was impressed with our students' knowledge and approach to problem-solving. All the Nexus VI students then

went out for dinner with Professor Leader, Dr. Foster and Mr. Chapman. The students had the opportunity to quiz Professor Leader on the Interview process at Cambridge, as well as telling him all about their Extended Project Qualification investigations.



"I'll be riding my 9 year old working Hunter Pony called 'Dun Paddy II" commented Charlotte. "I've


competed a lot with Paddy at many different shows but RIHS is a particularly special event as it's is one of the biggest outdoor shows in the country."



they would like to try outside of school. Each club has also offered free taster sessions at their clubs to encourage the children to come along outside of school.

Every child that took part in the afternoon had a fantastic experience (and a very hot one!) and really enjoyed trying the new activities.
